The North Sea and Baltic Sea is one of the busiest stretches of water in the world. To ensure that ships are able to reach their destinations safely, undamaged and on time, various safety and security authorities need to work together. Recently, they have begun doing so under one roof – at the Maritime Safety and Security Centre in Cuxhaven. On 24-hour chairs from StolComfort.

Opened in February 2017 by German Transport
Minister Dobrindt in an official ceremony, the Maritime
Safety and Security Centre (MSSC) is the only one of
its kind in the world. Never before has there been a
centre which sees all the organisations responsible
for safety and security at sea working together.
The modern building now houses more than 100
members of staff from the Federal Police, Customs,
the Waterways and Shipping Administration, the
German Navy, the Harbour Police and the Central
Command for Maritime Emergencies (CCME). Their
common goal is to provide safety and protection in
one of the busiest marine areas in the world – the

North and Baltic Seas. At the heart of the MSSC is the Joint Sea Emergency Operations Centre. The 225 m² space houses 13 members of staff around the clock, monitoring the North and Baltic Seas. In the event of an emergency or marine accident, this is where the different strands of the rescue operation come together.

To ensure that staff are able to remain focused on their work at all times, StolComfort has equipped the MSSC with 24-hour chairs. The authorities in the Maritime Safety and Security Centre all have different responsibilites: The Federal Police monitor the maritime borders of the North and Baltic Seas to prevent unlawful entry, for example. They are also responsible for monitoring shipping traffic and investigate violations of environmental regulations, for example. The responsibilities of the Harbour Police include ensuring compliance with shipping safety regulations and investigating naval accidents. In the event of a serious accident, CCME coordinates the operation, acting as an intermediary between the federal government and Germany's coastal states.

The MSSC also houses the Point of Contact (PoC), which acts as a central information hub for navigation and security agencies in the event of any threats or terror risks. Ships flying under the German flag

can send a so-called 'silent alarm' to the PoC from anywhere in the world if their safety or security is threatened – for example to signify a pirate attack. When the PoC receives the signal, the necessary emergency measures are set in motion and safety is restored once more on the seas.


Neighbours, pop stars and tasty delicacies

Sweden and Norway are known to be friendly neighbours. It's hard to imagine, but that hasn't always been

the case. It was only in 1905, after the end of a war, that Norway won full independence from Sweden. Since then, the two countries have been united by a kind of love-hate relationship. Norwegians regard the Swedes as the schoolmasters of Scandinavia – always polite, but also very boring. To the Swedes on the other hand, their neighbours are smooth operators and best not to be relied on. In recent decades, however, the relationship has become very positive. Many Swedes work in Norway and travelling across the border is part of everyday life. Even so, the jokes about Norway being a little backward haven't disappeared completely: 'The pilot just before landing says "We will shortly be landing in Oslo. Please put your watches back 30 years."'



The Jantelag – or the law of Jante – has always been around in Sweden, and it shapes society. Essentially, it means: Standing out forbidden. Or: Just don't think you're anything special. As a result, both in private and professional life, people keep their own opinions to themselves and avoid conflict. Show-offs are frowned upon in Sweden even more so than elsewhere, and luxury brands like Ferrari are therefore controversial. Swedes are often uncomfortable with compliments and professional qualifications such as a doctorate are rarely named on business cards. Despite their reserve, Sweden has been home to some of the most internationally successful pop music beside the US and the UK. Since ABBA conquered the global charts in the 70s, successful new bands, singers and producers are constantly being born in the small Nordic nation. You won't seem them putting on airs and grace or connected with scandals, though. Thank Jante.



Everyone's heard of cinnamon swirls and Swedish 'Köttbullar' meatballs – or at least anyone who's been shopping in IKEA. Yet Swedish cuisine has much more interesting culinary delicacies to offer. Blood pudding is a classic – a Christmas dish made from pig's blood mixed with grains and sweet spices. Another Swedish speciality are the endless flavours of crispbread, soured milk called Filmjölk, the bread-and-butter cake known as Smorgastarta, and cheese in tubes – in more than 50 different flavors. Swedes don't just

like hearty food, though – with consumption of sweets at 18 kg per capita, they have the biggest sweet tooth in the world.


